Did You Know?

- According to the 2000 census, 15.2 percent of Americans share a German heritage.
- The first German settlers came in 1608 to Jamestown, Va., to supply the settlement with craftsmen.
- In 1683, the first permanent German settlement was founded at Germantown, Pa., which is now part of Philadelphia.
- By 1790, Germans made up 10 percent of the total population of the U.S.
- Between 1800 and 1900, 5 million Germans immigrated to the U.S.; the largest wave was in 1830-40 due to failed revolutions in the homeland to united the German states.

Food service begins at noon, and features the cold Pomeranian cherry soup (Kirsch-suppe), which is unique to the Pomeranian culture. In

addition to brats, hot dogs, roast pork, German potato salad, sauerkraut, red cabbage, and great homemade Pomeranian desserts, there will be some good German beer and soft drinks. The prices for the food and beverages are very reasonable.

We invite all the Bogenschneider descendants (whatever their name is) to celebrate their Pomeranian heritage, and for the first time to have the opportunity to meet all the different U.S. Bogenschneider families.

Burkhard "Börks" Bogenschneider

A few of us here in the U.S. corresponded with Burkhard "Börks" Bogenschneider, who lived in Lübeck, Germany. Börks died on September 22, 2007 from pancreatic cancer in Lübeck. He was born in 1944 in Berlinchen, Neumark, Soldin (near Stettin), Pomera-

Börks was a post-war war refugee child, who fled with his mother and two younger siblings while being pursued by the Russian army from Pomerania. The family established itself in Lübeck. His father,

Erwin, was killed in the war.

Very early in his life he took an interest in music, with a special interest in the emerging Rock n' Roll movement. His interests progressed over the vears to Rock a Billy and also to country music. He also had a keen interest in football. He traveled at the early age of 16 to distant places as a ship's cabin boy. Over the years, he worked as a sailor, mostly on cargo ships, but once even on the cruise ship Stella Maris. When he returned to land, he remained interested in ships

and lighthouses. He had a web site showing these interests. As a former DJ, he was a freelancer for radio and TV, and he also worked as a columnist, author and co-author of various articles in magazines and journals, as well as specialty books. For over thirty years, he was the chairman of the "Memory Hits Fan Club (MFC)" radio broadcast of the DLF with Gerd Alzen, with whom he was also a friend, and about whom he had also written a noteworthy article in Country-Home.

Why is there a Pommerscher Verein Freistadt? Why are there so many Pomeranians in the area? Why is Pommerntag celebrated here?

Prussian King Friedrich Wilhelm III united the Reformed (Calvinist) and Lutheran churches in 1817 on the 300th anniversary of the Reformation. A new church liturgy was introduced in 1827, and by 1829 there was a threat of a fine if this liturgy was not used in Pomeranian churches. Initially about 2,000 Lutherans and a growing number of clergy resisted this new Union church. They formed the Free Lutheran Church in June 1830. This group went by many names such as Breslau Synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Prussia. The nickname Alt Lutheraner (Old Lutherans) came about after about 1845.

In the Lutheran dominated areas of Saxony, Mecklenburg, and Pomerania, it was feared that Lutheran beliefs were being replaced with Reformed doctrines. Lutheran church services were banned, and clergy not accepting the Union liturgy were dismissed or arrested. Children were to be sent to Union schools, and money was paid to support Union pastors even if they didn't attend Union services. Secret Lutheran services were held in homes, barns, forests, or quarries.

This all started discussions of emigration to have religious freedom. The first group of Old Lutherans decided to emigrate in 1837, with others following the next few years. They went to Australia, Canada and the United States. Starting in 1838, the emigrants were required to take with them a like-minded pastor. In 1839, 40 Pomeranian families bought more than 1,000 acres of land in the western part of the Town of Mequon. This area was given the name Freistadt ("free city"). They founded Trinity Lutheran Church, which became the first German Lutheran Church in Wisconsin.

- Take the Lannon Rd. / WI-167 exit (Exit 54) toward CR-Y / Mequon
- Go East on WI-167 / Lannon Rd. for 8.6 miles
- Turn Left or north on N. Cedarburg Rd.
- Go 0.1 miles and the park will be on the left side or

west side of the road.

From I-43 north of Milwaukee

- Take I-43 North toward Green Bay from Milwaukee or I-43 South if coming from the north
- Take the Mequon Rd. / WI-167 West / WI-57 South exit—(Exit 85)
- Go west on WI-167 / WI-57
 S /W. Mequon Rd. for 3.1
 miles
- Turn slight Right onto N. Cedarburg Rd. for 0.1 miles and the park will be on the left side or west side of the

road.
